Introduction of retrieval activities throughout lessons which is included in the school's pedagogical model. Reviewed curriculum to focus on lesson sequencing to help support cognitive load.	 Progress 8 gap in Year 11 results between PP and non PP students has slightly widened from the previous year. GCSE Art and BTEC Enterprise results show that PP students are achieving approximately 1 grade higher than non PP students. All students had 80 mins guided reading each week with their form tutor. All Year 11 PP students had access to free GCSE Revision Guides to further support their learning. All students have access to the core knowledge they need to be successful in each subject- this knowledge is displayed in our Kemnal Keys.
	 100% of PP students have been offered an ipad or laptop to complete work at home. All class teachers are aware of the reading ages of their Pupil Premium students as indicated on seating plans and whole school CPD Pupil Premium student reading ages are tracked termly, shared with staff and intervention put in place for those that require additional reading support. Teaching is also adapted to aid the implementation of new vocabulary. Pupil Premium students are regularly given an opportunity to read a vast array of texts from all walks of life in order to enrich their cultural capital, whether it be Form time, dedicated reading lessons or in class texts.
ACE Mentoring	 All PP students had an ACE Mentor and most students found this helped with confidence building and enjoyed the sessions. A full time ACE Mentor was recruited and trained to help support more PP students.

Improve pastoral support, wrap around care and extended offer to improve attendance and behaviour.	 The school monitors this access to confidential services including looking at levels of access for those eligible for pupil premium. Form time has a session dedicated to attendance; students are encouraged to attend school through our reward system. Reduction in behaviour issues for PP- this work continues. Positive uptake for Counselling sessions and other workshops such as self- esteem, anger manager and mental health. We have increased the amount of extracurricular clubs the school can take part in before and after school as well during lunchtime. We have extended our lunch break in order for more students to attend
	these clubs.
