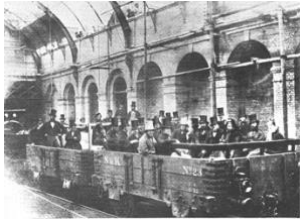


# HISTORICAL CONTEXT

1. The London Underground was the world's first underground railway, opening in January 1863.



2. It was called The Metropolitan Railway and it used gas-lit wooden carriages hauled by steam locomotives and ran between Paddington and Farringdon.



3. On 18<sup>th</sup> December 1890, The City and South London Railway opens the world's first deep-level electric railway, running from King William Street in the City of London, under the River Thames via the Thames Tunnel built by Sir Marc Brunel and his son Isambard in 1843, to Stockwell.

A syllable is a word or part of a word with a vowel sound.














These are the rhythms that you will be using for your tube rap.



Stations:

- Waterloo – 3 syllables – Wa-ter-loo – so this would go into the 3 syllables column
- Embankment – also 3 syllables – Em-bank-ment – so this would also go into the 3-syllable column
- Charing Cross – 3 syllables
- Piccadilly Circus – 6 syllables! Pi-ca-di-lly-Cir-cus – so this would go into the last column
- Oxford Circus – 4 syllables – Ox-ford-Cir-cus – so this would go in the 4 syllables column
- Regents Park – 3 syllables

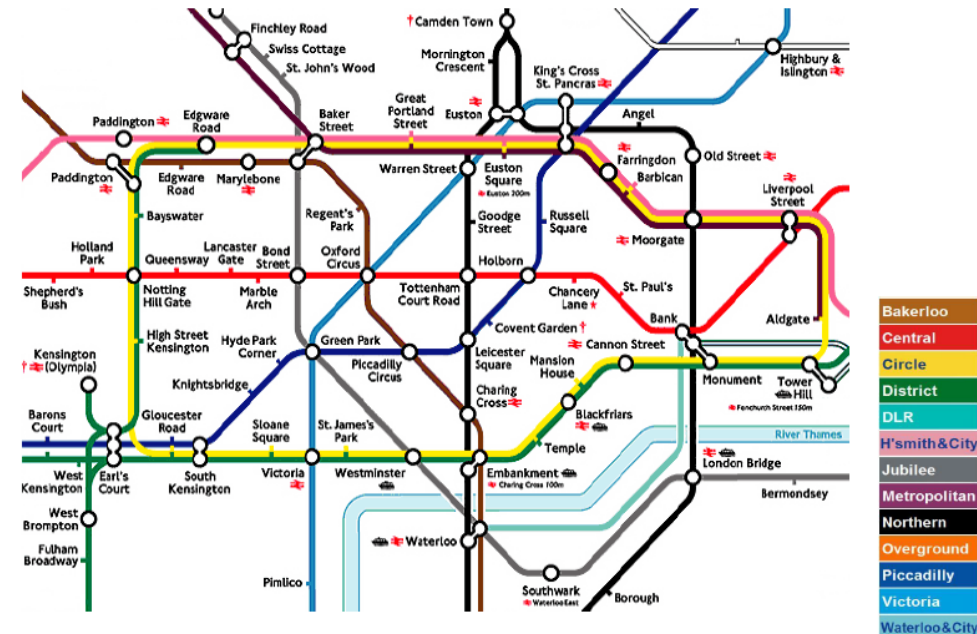
