Our Planets

















These are the planets in our solar system. Composers have always been fascinated with space, and Gustav **HOLST**, an English composer, wrote a piece of music called 'The Planets Suite' to describe the **CHARACTERISTICS** of each planet. Holst identifies the planets as:

Musical Vocabulary

COMPOSER – someone who writes/makes up music

OSTINATO – a repeated musical pattern; can be rhythmic or melodic or a combination of both


DYNAMICS – how loud or soft the music is

CRESCENDO – a dynamic marking indicating to the performer to gradually get louder **SUITE** – a longer piece of music made up of several shorter pieces (movements) grouped together, often with a similar theme


MOOD – the feeling and atmosphere that a piece of music creates

MOVEMENT – the name given to an individual piece of music which, when grouped together, forms a larger-scale work *e.g. a Suite*. Each of the movements in a suite of music is normally different in some way, contrasted by elements such as pitch, tempo and dynamics.

Mars: Bringer of War;










Saturn: Uranus: The Magician Bringer of Old Age
